BOARD CONFERENCE CALL Friday, June 20, 1997

SUMMARY OF MINUTES

Members on-line: Vincent Orlando, *President*; Kathy Carpenter, *President-Elect*; Patricia Mulcahy-Ernt, *Past-President*; Sylvia Mioduski, *Treasurer*; Rosalind Lee, *Secretary*.

The meeting was called to order at 8:03 a.m. PDT.

1. Agenda Approved

The agenda was approved.

2. Minutes Approved

The minutes of the April 24, 1997 conference call were formally approved.

3. Mailing Service

It was moved that Neighborhood Data and Mail of Denver, CO be approved as the CRLA mailing service. This company will receive all general CRLA mail and will manage the membership database. Conference registrations will continue to go to the conference site. The transition of services to this company will occur over the summer. Details will be outlined in the President's column of the next issue of the *Newsletter*.

4. Web Sites

It was moved that \$300 be added to the conference budget for maintenance of the conference web site and \$300 be added to the operating budget for maintenance of the regular web site. The conference web site (http://www.mscd.edu/~crla) will be supervised by Vince. This site has information on past conferences in addition to the 1997 Sacramento conference. This gives people not familiar with our conferences some perspective of our annual meetings.

Vince will speak to Lucy Macdonald to see if she wishes to continue supervising the regular web site (www.chemek.cc.or.us/crla).

5. Long-Term Goals for CRLA

Karen Smith, Becky Johnen and Pat will spend time in July creating a draft document regarding long-range goals for CRLA and their implementation. Board members will receive this document at the next board meeting and make suggestions. The document will be presented to members in Sacramento at a plenary session and at a concurrent session for input and feedback.

6. Exhibits Chair

Donna Wood and Susan Halter have submitted applications for this position. Carol Wills will also submit an application. Kathy has developed a scheme whereby sponsors have the opportunity to support the conference in a variety of ways from hosting a booth to a meal function.

7. 1997 Sacramento Conference Budget

The budget for the 1997 Sacramento Conference was approved. The projected income is \$64,650 and estimated expenses are \$47,650. This yields a projected net profit of \$17,000.

8. 1997-1998 Operating Budget

The operating budget for 1997-1998 was approved. In addition to earlier revisions, the following will be incorporated: \$250 will be added for materials for the leadership workshop and the advertising budget for the *JCRL* will be increased by \$2000. Sylvia will send a copy of the full budget to each board member and send to other officers the section which pertains to them.

9. Awards

To advertise the awards and scholarships CRLA offers its members, Valerie Smith Stephens has written an article for the *Newsletter*. It was suggested she also promote the recipients during the conference and on LRNASST to encourage more members to apply for these awards.

10. Journal of College Reading and Learning

Cheryl Mott has resigned as Executive Editor. Maureen Hewlett, of British Columbia, will assume the duties of this position. The position has been re-named Managing Editor.

A report detailing the process, timelines and number of manuscripts handled by the *JCRL* Editorial Advisory Board in the last few months was submitted.

11. Learning Center Monograph

Karen Smith and Frank Christ are editing the document created by the Learning Assistance Center Task Force headed by Carolyn Smith. The final work will be a monograph CRLA sells as it does the *Tutor Training Handbook*.

12. CAS Representative

Becky Johnen will represent CRLA on the Council for the Advancement of Standards in Higher Education (CAS), replacing Martha Maxwell.

13. National Tutoring Association (NTA)

There is some concern that the NTA is planning to initiate a tutor certification program. This could duplicate our program and confuse tutor training professionals. Vince has contacted Jack Truschel about possible overlap between what NTA was discussing and what CRLA is doing. Gladys Shaw has also been in contact with Jack and Kathy Nuse. Jack indicated that NTA would be careful not to duplicate CRLA's efforts.

14. Conference Portfolio

Vince continues to update the package used by presidents-elect in planning their conference.

15. 1997 Sacramento Conference

Kathy continues to work hard preparing the conference. A second "Sneak Preview" will be mailed soon. The Call to Conference is scheduled to be mailed by July 15. She gave special credit to Pat Jonason for her contributions.

Walter Pauk will be presented with a special award from CRLA at the luncheon during the Sacramento conference.

16. 1998 Salt Lake City Conference

Mike O'Hear has developed the logo for this conference around Delicate Arch in Utah. **John Gardner**, expert in the freshman year experience, will give the keynote address and a follow-up session.

17. States and Regions

Pat complimented the California chapter on the program description she received. It supplemented their video conference on web-based instruction held recently.

Pat will attend the joint conference of OADE and the Ohio River Valley region in November. She will present a session "Expanding professional horizons through CRLA" and an academic session.

Vince will represent the board at the Texas state conference in the fall.

18. Next Conference Call

The next conference call will be Thursday, September 4 at 11:30 a.m. PDT.

My name is Valeric Smith Stephens and I am the Awards and Scholarships Chair of the College Reading and Learning Association. Since I am new to this position, I need your assistance in encouraging members of your Special Interest Groups to apply for the CRLA scholarships. I have received very few applications for these scholarships and awards. If you need application forms I will be happy to send them.

To summarize the scholarship and awards program, CRLA offers these scholarships:

- 1. \$500 Scholarship Award. Applicants do not have to be full-time students but must be members of CRLA and planning on registering for a minimum of nine credit hours during the calendar year. Demonstration of registration in a degree-program is required.
- 2. \$500 Research Assistance Award. This award is given to support significant research in the areas of post-secondary reading, learning assistance, developmental education, or tutorial services. Studies may be quantitative or qualitative in nature.
- 3. \$100 Distinguished Research Award. This award consists of an honorarium and a plaque given in recognition of a significant research article. The article must have been published within two years of the deadline for nominations.

All scholarships and awards are available to CRLA members only. The deadline for applications and nominations is August 15, 1997.



Apparently CRLA and NTA have several members in common. This memo is being directed to you because I was told by some of them about the NTA goal I address below.

Subsequent to your recent annual conference, several people have contacted me expressing concern about NTA's goal of developing a tutor certification and a tutor program certificate accreditation program. The concern expressed, and certainly one I have, are the implications for the profession of Developmental Education if every organization develops its own standards in various areas. Also, it seems contradictory to NTA's representation on the task force working on forming an inter-organizational council to address the common concerns of our various organizations in learning assistance and developmental education on a national international level.

As you may know CRLA's International Tutor Certification program is based on several years of input, analysis, and evaluation from professionals across the nation; it is not just a program implemented by a group of CRLA members. It has also been endorsed by NTA, NADE, and commission XVI of ACPA. In short, it is a program for the profession developed by practitioners across the nation and in Canada; CRLA was only the driving force and administrator, just as NADE has been on the Self-Assessment Guides. If, indeed, a council is organized for the whole profession, it is possible these programs may be placed in that governing structure. It is certainly the intent that future such initiatives affecting the whole profession would come under the auspices of the council.

If NTA is actually planning to develop a tutor certification and a tutor program certificate accreditation, I would encourage you to consider collaborating on the existing certification program and the council development instead. The Council is in its developmental stages and input is welcome. The Tutor Certification Program is a program subject to revision as professionals give us feedback. In fact, I am in the process of collecting information from programs that are recertifying and the evaluators regarding concerns and needed revisions. Ideas from you and your NTA colleagues would be warmly welcomed.



This invitation is extended to you because of your international reputation and expertise as an author, public speaker, consultant, and scholar of the American freshman year/students in transition reform movement. We recognize that your personal knowledge and ability to address your subject are unique to American higher education, and we look forward to having you with us.

As we had discussed on the phone, since you will be an invited speaker, the College Reading and Learning Association will pay for all your conference travel expenses, meals, lodging, and registration fees, plus an honorarium of \$1500. Although it is not required that you do so, we do hope that you will be able to participate in the full conference, especially since CRLA members typically enjoy the informality of small group follow-up discussions that run throughout our conference.

The keynote address is usually a 30 to 45 minute presentation during the First General Session, which is attended by approximately five hundred people. During the 1998 Conference it will be scheduled for Thursday, November 5. The topic for the address is one of your own choice; I'd be happy to discuss some ideas with you if you'd like some feedback about topics that would be of interest to the CRLA membership. Although the membership is quite diverse, the common thread that links us together is an interest in college developmental education, particularly in the delivery of programs for students who are academically underprepared to meet the demands of college-level courses.

CRLA Board Meeting Conference Call

Report on JCRL manuscript handling for the Spring 1997 issue.

The goal of the Journal of College Reading and Learning's new editorial team is to elicit more and better manuscripts. To this end the team has implemented a strategy of efficient processing of manuscripts and favorable treatment of authors. The JCRL received a total of thirty-one manuscript submissions for the spring 1997 issue. For these manuscripts, the rate of acceptance was thirty-five percent, which breaks down as follows:

accept: 0
accept with revisions: 11
revise and resubmit: 5
reject: 15

The objective of better treatment of authors includes behaviors such as keeping the author informed of the article's progress, and rapid passage of the manuscript through the three stages of the review and decision process. The goal for step one, the notification of manuscript receipt, is to notify the author the same week the manuscript arrives. In the case of the spring issue, the actual amount of time to notify author of receipt of manuscript was:

same day : 21 two to four days: 8 five to seven days: 2

At the same time as the author is notified of the manuscript's arrival, copies of the manuscript are sent out for review, with the request that the reviews be returned within two months. For the most part, this goal has been met, although some reviews were never received. The time for all reviewers to review (from receipt of manuscript) was:

more than two months: 1 one to two months: 16 less than one month: 9

Once the reviews are in, a decision on the article's suitability to the JCRL is made and the author is notified of the decision. The total turnaround time (received author notified of decision) for JCRL articles was:

more than two months: 2 one to two months; 19 less than one month: 10

Techtalk: Professional Development through the WWW

Several years ago, we (Caverly & Broderick, 1993) introduced the Internet as a means of continued professional growth. Through the use of e-mail and gophers, the Internet is a place where the intellectual charge we get from professional conferences and/or graduate school can be generated year round. Since then, the Internet has become easier to use through the implementation of a point and click navigation system called the World Wide Web (WWW). With the free dissemination to educators of <u>Netscape Navigator 3.0</u> emerging only two years ago and <u>Internet Explorer 3.0</u> last year, we have been able to surf through resources on literally millions of computers world wide. Recently, developmental educators have begun to collect these wanderings into webpage collections of useful sites.

To expand the development of our National Association for Developmental Education (NADE) Technology SPIN (Special Interest group) webpage, we decided to create a webpage listing those useful sites specific to the professional development of developmental educators and developmental students. However, at least two sites already exist where many of these resources can be found. These are located at the College Reading & Learning Association (CRLA) homepage created by Lucy MacDonald and at the Whole Language Developmental Education Webliography created by Dave. We decided to link our NADE Technology SPIN page to these pages, rather than reinventing the wheel. In this column, we use the Webliography as an exemplar of the two sites as we showcase examples of professional development resources organized into categories including: Professional Organizations, Research, Learning Centers, On-Line Writing Labs, Distance Education, and Student Development webpages. In the next column, we will review those WWW sites helpful to our students.

Professional Organizations

Most professional organizations focused on developmental education have created webpages. If you go to the Webliography, there are links to homepages for comprehensive organizations like the College Reading & Learning Association (CRLA) and the National Association for Developmental Education (NADE). (These and the other web addresses we refer to are underlined and listed at the end.) In addition, professional resources in reading are available through professional organizations like the International Reading Association (IRA) or the National Reading Conference (NRC). Similarly, there are professional organization webpages for English instruction through the National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE) and Conference on College Composition and Communication (CCCC), as well as webpages for math instruction through the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics (NCTM). These professional organizations' webpages provide information on how to join the organization, receive conference announcements and calls for papers, as well as order publications available through the organization.

Research Dissemination

Researchers are beginning to make their work available on the web through discussion groups, publication of their papers in electronic journals, or their university's site. The Webliography has organized these research publications into areas of General Research, Reading Instruction, Hypertexts, Writing Instruction, Math Instruction, English as a Second Language, Support Services, and Technology. For example, under the General Research category you can find links to papers like Practical Approaches to Instructional Technology, abstracts from the ERIC Clearinghouses like Fostering Cognitive Development in College Students, or publications from the U.S. Department of Education like Remedial Education in Higher Education Institutions-1995.

Under the Reading Instruction category you will find articles like College Developmental Reading or Vygotsky Readings List. There are theoretical papers under Hypertexts (Hyper/Text/Theory) as well as hypertext samples (On-Line Books Page). Writing Instruction offers, for example, papers on assessing composition (Writing Assessment at the College Level) and the results of a survey of writing centers at community colleges (Community College Writing Centers). Remedial Math Instruction is discussed in Calculus Remediation using Databases and Most Common Mistakes in College Math. Developmental education for English as a Second Language (ESL) students is presented in Mathematics and the ESL Student and a nice collection of ESL resources is provided at the ESL Virtual Catalog. Under the Support Services heading, you will find a survey (Survey of Support Services). Finally, within the Technology heading there are papers on how to use technology in a learning support center (Technology and the Learning Assistance Center) and an excellent collection of papers (Instructional Technology Connections).

Other research resources on the <u>Webliography</u> are links to professional journals, many of which are available electronically (see <u>Argus</u> for a list); academic discussion groups (<u>Directory of Scholarly and Professional E-Conferences</u>); on-line reference libraries (<u>On-Line Library Catalogs</u>); as well as electronic periodicals (<u>On-line Newspapers</u>). Abstracts of professional education journals can be found at <u>ERIC</u> and research librarians will help you with your research at the <u>AskERIC Homepage</u>.

Another treasure trove on the WWW is the technology resources. You can find reviews of software (<u>Project Synergy</u>), shareware and free software (<u>Literacy Shareware for the Mac</u> or <u>Swedish University</u>), and even demonstration versions of current or upgrades of commercial software programs (<u>Software.com</u>).

Developmental Education Webpages

More developmental educators now are sharing their programs through webpages. These webpages show us how they organize their program, what services are provided, and number of hours open. Many of these sites provide syllabi for courses they offer, handouts or tip sheets for students, and even criteria for hiring tutors.

The <u>Webliography</u> has organized these developmental education webpages into learning centers, on-line writing labs, math labs, and developmental education courses. Excellent examples of community college learning centers can be found at <u>Maricopa Community College</u> or <u>Oakton Community College</u>. Similarly, excellent examples of college or university learning centers can be found at the <u>University of Pittsburg</u>, <u>Rutgers University</u>, or the <u>University of Arizona</u>.

Collections of WWW sites for writing instruction and on-line writing labs are located at INKSPOT and the University of British Columbia. Examples of community college on-line writing labs include some for community colleges (Roane State Community College or Taft Community College) and others for colleges and universities (Grinnell College or Purdue University). There are also sites for math labs (Bowling Green State University) or Southwest Texas State University). Examples of developmental education courses reside at Cerritos College and, naturally, at Whole Language College Reading. Finally, there are webpages specifically oriented to tutoring, CRLA tutoring certification, and to faculty development.

Conclusion

The WWW is like an on-going professional conference where you can learn about theory, research, and practice. Like the bazaars in Morocco, you can find just about everything on the WWW. If you know of other useful resources, please e-mail the addresses to us.

Subject: JCRL Spring 1997 Report

Report on JCRL manuscript handling for the Spring 1997 issue.

The goal of the Journal of College Reading and Learning' s new editorial team is to elicit more and better manuscripts. To this end the team has implemented a strategy of efficient processing of manuscripts and favorable treatment of authors. The JCRL received a total of thirty-one manuscript submissions for the spring 1997 issue. For these manuscripts, the acceptance rate was thirty-five percent, which breaks down as follows:

accept: 0
accept with revisions: 11
revise and resubmit: 5
reject: 15

The objective of better treatment of authors includes behaviors such as keeping the author informed of the article's progress, and rapid passage of the manuscript through the three stages of the review and decision process. The goal for step one, the notification of manuscript receipt, is to notify the author the same week the manuscript arrives. In the case of the spring issue, the actual amount of time to notify authors of the receipt of their manuscript was:

same day : 21
two to four days: 8
five to seven days: 2

When the author is notified of the manuscript'^ s arrival, copies of the manuscript are sent out for review, with the request that the reviews be returned within two months. For the most part, this goal has been met, although some reviews were never received. The time for all reviewers to review (from receipt of manuscript) was:

more than two months: 1 one to two months: 16 less than one month: 9

Once the reviews are in, a decision on the article's suitability to the JCRL is made and the author is notified of the decision. The total turn-around time (manuscript received to author notified of decision) for JCRL articles was:

more than two months: 2 one to two months: 19 less than one month: 10
